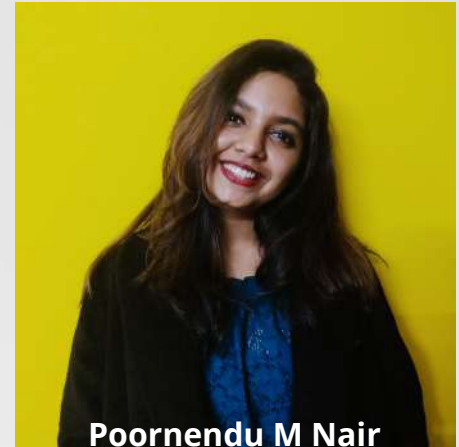

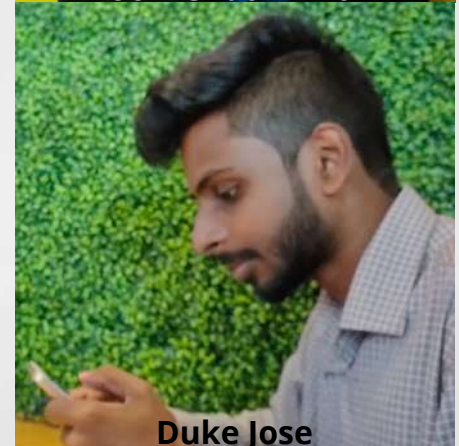

COMPANIES (INCORPORATION) AMENDMENT RULES, 2020 AND SPICE+

The Companies (Incorporation) amendment rules 2020 came into force from the 23rd of February, 2020 as a part of India's ease of doing business initiatives. It revamps the way companies are incorporated, right from the first step of name application.

The MCA, by bringing the revised incorporation forms, seeks to provide about 10 services in itself, where different government departments would work in tandem with the MCA to provide these services. The goal here is to provide a one-stop solution to all the incorporation requirements of an entity, that include the following:

1. Name approval
2. Allotment of DIN
3. Incorporation of Companies
4. Application for PAN and TAN
5. Registration under EPFO and ESIC
6. Allotment of GSTIN
7. Application for opening a bank account
8. Registration for Profession Tax (Only for the state of Maharashtra)

Let us first understand the changes in the Amended rule by making a comparison.

Companies (Incorporation) Amendment Rules, 2014	Companies (Incorporation) Amendment Rules, 2020
1. Reservation and Change of name both done through the 'RUN' Form as per Rule 9.	1. The reservation of name for a New company is to be done by using the SPICE+ form only, however in order to change the name of an existing company, the 'RUN' form is to be used.
2. The Incorporation, allotment of DIN, allotment of PAN and allotment of TAN was taken care of by the SPICE form.	2. The Incorporation of Companies, allotment of DIN, allotment of PAN and allotment of TAN are taken care of by using the new and improved 'SPICE+' Form.
3. EPFO, ESIC registrations were optional and bank accounts were not integrated into the incorporation process.	3. EPFO, ESIC Registrations are compulsory. The proposed company will be compulsorily required to open a bank account and this process will be integrated into the process of incorporation.

In addition to these, all the forms related to incorporation have been revamped. Let us discuss in brief about the forms required for Incorporation of a company.

1. SPICe+ (Simplified Proforma for Incorporating Company Electronically Plus)

The 'SPICE +' is the new form replacing the erstwhile 'SPICE' form, that was used to Incorporate a company. In addition to being an updated version of the 'SPICE' form it replaces, it is also now a web based form, that gives it a lot of advantages over the old PDF forms.

It is divided into two parts:

I. PART A

Part A of the SPICe+ form deals with allotment of name and it replaces the erstwhile RUN form, that used to handle the name allotment for a new company.

II. PART B

PART B of the form deals with other incorporation procedures, and allotment of DIN.

2. AGILE - PRO (Application for Goods and Services Tax identification number, employees state Insurance corporation registration plus Employees provident fund organization registration, Profession tax Registration and Opening of Bank Account)

As the name suggests, this form is what integrates services such as Allotment of GSTIN, registration under EPFO and ESIC, Registration for Profession tax (Only for the state of Maharashtra) and opening of a bank account.

3. RUN (Reserve Unique Name)

The RUN form is used for allotting a new name to an existing company, earlier it was used for the name allotment for a new company as well, but however the new amendment relieves the form of that duty.

These forms, as mentioned earlier do promote ease of starting a business and how they help are discussed below.

- SPICe Plus is provides almost 10 services via 3 central govt ministries and departments (Ministry of Labour, Department of Revenue in the Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Corporate Affairs).
- Easy Name application through PART - A of the SPICe+ Form.
- The applicant can save and modify the entered information on the application.
- A new and user-friendly Dashboard is being created for company incorporation applications (SPICe+ and linked forms as applicable).
- Incorporation applications (Part B) after name reservation (In Part A) can be submitted as a seamless process in continuation of Part A of SPICe+.
- Easy Resubmission of Forms. | Auto population and prefill of linked forms (AGILE - PRO, eMOA, eAOA, URC-1, INC-9 as applicable).
- Divided into sections and ability to save in each section.
- Check form and prescrutiny validation in the web form itself.
- Corrections can be de (even after generating pdf and affixing DSCs)

My days before the lockdown

(18-20 March)

A nap after your alarm blares is one of the sweetest things in the universe. Unfortunately, it is a delicacy not affordable to all. It took some effort to drag myself up from the bed and brush the Teeth. In my daily skimming of the newspaper, my eyes stumbles upon news of a new virus named Corona (**CoV**), I felt baffled though-I had dreamt of exactly the same thing a few nights back...

With all these thoughts in my mind, I lost track of time and ended up late for office. Everyone has different alternatives to reach their office- some use their own vehicles, while some have to use public conveyance...Well I fall into the latter category.

It's a small walk to the bus station. The bus stop is filled with different kinds of people like school kids, college students, workers & a CA Student. **(Student, Private colleger & a Worker)** A ride on the bus, particularly during the 9-10 AM stint, is like rolling a dice-you are extremely lucky if you get a seat. A crowded and congested bus is a numero Uno hotspot for community spread of pathogens. **(Corona is a droplet infection, what are the odds to that)**. A bus ride in itself is pretty demanding- it is a process starting with getting on the bus, finding a seat (or clinging onto the bars), getting tickets, getting the balance in coins **(The virus has a potential to stick on metals for 48 hours. Should I ask the conductor to keep the change?)** Boarding the bus is easier than leaving it, I say.

It is human tendency to scratch the nose, ears & eyes. CoV spreads fast though these sensory organs- this is when sanitizers become a basic necessity of life. Being on out audit, it was a great relief to find that I reached the client office, albeit late **(but not as late as I thought)**.

Now the only worries are with regard to how I should deal with clients. Should I shake hands with them, or will a fist bump do? XD **(The office finally reached a consensus that mailing all the clients would be a better option. In case they do come to the office, we should greet them a traditional Namaste if they want a Handshake.)**

I was a bit more cautious as I was part of an out audit, and equipped with items **(read: Sanitizer)** to protect myself. The situation was moving from bad to worse and finally, our offices decided to close down for the time being. Returning home was a bit difficult as my route touched the Nedumbassery international airport.**(There were only 4 people in the bus, including the driver and the conductor)**

I guess this lockdown will be more of a blessing in disguise- time to devote for those hobbies that I've wanted to pursue for a long time, an opportunity to spend time with family and to plan the next moves of SICASA.

Life in the time of corona

Saturday, 28th March 2020

Things have gone further downhill today. A sexagenarian from the Chullikkal region of Ernakulam finally succumbed to death from pneumonia, worsened by the fatal coronavirus. The man had returned from the Emirates and is assumed to have caught on the pathogen from there. He also had a history of cardiac disease, so it was only a matter of time before he lost his war against the grim reaper. The previous day had seen 39 patients being tested positive for CoVid-19 in the state.

Six days into curfew and four days after 144 has been declared in the district, people still have not gotten the idea of 'staying home' into their heads, it seems. The authorities have instructed that nobody should go beyond a one-mile radius from their current location and officers have been placed in strategic locations all over the city. The police have lost patience in dealing with 'stray humans' roaming the roads, particularly when the penalty of Rs.10,000 plus 2 years of imprisonment has been announced for such foolhardiness. Hoping that the news of the first CoVid-19 death in the state will result in more people keeping to their homes.

ICAI too has finally caught the wind of the situation - the BoS announcement that May exams have been postponed to late June and early July was a news very much welcomed by all. Further, another notification from the ICAI asking practicing Chartered Accountants to give holidays to students, plus the assurance that any leave taken by the articles during this period will be considered as an office holiday was music to our ears. That being said, even the strictest and the most merciless firms in Kochi have extended 'work from home' facility to their articles, the latest one on the 23rd, a day after the Janta Curfew.

However, the same cannot be said for all other establishments. Mother still has to go to work on every alternate day at the local co-operative bank- in close proximity with people of all kinds. As a result, Dad and I have to step out of our home to take her to the bank. This also means that we will be stopped at checkpoints, where we have to produce the affidavit showing purpose of journey as well as both riders' IDs and a letter from Mum's office before the officers.

The other day, she was recounting the scene where a 76-year old man visiting the bank for no reason, when the government has issued strict guidelines regarding the 70+ populace. If this is the case with people who do not have to go anywhere other than home and office, the scenario of the bank agents who have to go from door to door to distribute the senior citizens' pension is as bad as the medical personnel on the frontlines.

It is alarming to note that new cases are being diagnosed day after day even after all domestic and international flights as well as all forms of public transport have been suspended. Does this really mean that community spread has happened as we feared? Cost of vegetables and other essentials have also started to skyrocket. The butcher's is so crowded that beef is not even available for sale. With the population going into panic mode and hoarding on supplies, the prices can be expected to go even higher.

Back home, we have enough supplies to last us for the rest of the curfew, at this rate of consumption. However, it won't be too long to see our fridge run out of vegetables, which will be undoubtedly a situation where we feel the soil eroding from beneath our feet. We can also consider ourselves fortunate, for there are so many households without enough food in stock. We can also expect a water scarcity as the water treatment plants at Aluva and elsewhere continue to be closed.

At home, we have finally settled down into the 'stay-at-home' routine. Since none of the family have to wake up early and get ready for work, the alarms are set to late morning, followed by brunch, tea and a stroll in the garden. Schedules of Work-from-home and self-improvement (including learning new language, music and exercises) Dinner is a quiet affair, making way for the highlight of the day- movie time. At 9.00 PM sharp, all lights go down as we settle ourselves to watch one from the '100 best movies list'.

I know that the itinerary sounds uncannily similar to that of what Anne Frank and Zlata Filipovic went through when they stayed home to protect themselves from shells, missiles and death himself. However, the only difference between us and the aforementioned women was that, they were caught in between a war between nations, while we are embroiled in a strife between life and a fatal disease, which may or may not be an underhanded form of war, as conspiracy theorists accuse of. Gives us all the more reason to stay home and protect ourselves and the world.
